Those involved are guided and inspired to grow a range of healthy fruit, vegetables and herbs.</li> <li>To get the most out of the Growbag they also provide links to the new curriculum across Science, D&amp;T, Maths, English, Computing and Art and Design. Growbag visited school each half term and worked with various PP and vulnerable children preparing, planting and harvesting fruits and vegetables.</li> <li>During Covid-19</li> <li>Key worker children in school spent time caring for the crops and harvested them to take home.</li> </ul>

Brilliant Club	We registered for 12 PP and/or vulnerable children to take part in the Brilliant Club programme but due to restrictions on how the programme could run, we have taken a credit from the company and will run this at the end of 2020-2021.
