Successful initiatives t	hroughout 2017-2018 included:	
Learning Mentor	Worked closely with PP and vulnerable pupils and their families to provide support and links to outside agencies. Monitored attendance and impacted positively on persistent absences by working with the families to overcome barriers to getting their child to school. Provided support in school to pupils in terms of bereavement support, behavioural problems, self-esteem, confidence, child protection, friendship issues, social skills etc	£21, 963.84
Teaching Assistants/HLTA/NN to implement interventions	We ensured the continuity of one TA per class and the addition of a HLTA who worked every afternoon with PP and vulnerable children on specific interventions. The TAs were able to deliver pastoral support to any vulnerable pupils on a daily basis. They also delivered interventions and small group support for those pupils who required extra help.	£36,502.85 £1,037.40 (EYPP)
Extra teacher in Year 6	AHT taught English and maths to a group of 12 every day which meant more personalised learning for all children, especially PP as class sizes were much smaller. AHT was able to implement new marking scheme really quickly so children benefited from small group, immediate feedback on their work. Interventions and targets were able to be more child specific as class sizes were smaller.	£10,000
Lunchtime Support	A play worker was employed to work at lunchtimes with a PP child for part of the year. When that child left, the play worker continued to work with PP and vulnerable children at lunchtimes on team games	£4,430
Curriculum enrichment, School visits & Residentials for current FSM	We paid for all FSM children to attend Residential visits in Y4, Y5 and Y6. Third Space Learning Intervention	Both children made outstanding progress in maths and met age related expected. Third space filled several gaps in prior learning which enabled teaches to build on this knowledge.	£500

Breakfast Club	A range of clubs offered daily before school. Places at clubs run by outside agencies during the school holidays were also offered to our PP families. School covered the cost of these clubs for PP children. - The proportion of children who receive PP funding achieved ARE in reading, writing, maths and combined at the end of KS2 was higher than National average for all children.
- A higher proportion of children who receive PP funding achieved ARE in writing, GPS and combined compared to the children not in receipt of PP funding
- Compared to LA figures, a much higher % of our children in • receipt of PP funding achieved ARE in reading, writing, GPS, maths and combined
- Attendance of children in receipt of PP funding in Year 6 was just below National figures for all children and an insignificant comparison to children not in receipt of PP funding
- Due to only 14% of whole school being in receipt of PP funding, attendance for whole school can be majorly effected by one or two children taking holiday in term time (for example)
- Average scaled scores and progress of children who receive • PP funding were both higher than those who do not

Early Years

- 50% of pupils in receipt of PP funding in EY also had multiple vulnerabilities such as medical, behavioural, emotional and SEND issues
- 100% of the children who did not achieve GLD appear in the multiple vulnerability category. These children will continue to receive various, specific interventions
